It is the year 2172 and nuclear disasters and climate change have caused many countries to flee Earth and settle in space. There is a civil war going on in Nigeria, where Biafra wants to break away from Nigeria because of a lack of representation in government, but Nigeria wants the precious minerals in Biafran land. Onyii is a girl on the Biafran side, and she lives in a camp for former child soldiers and girls orphaned by the war. She is an Augment, meaning that she has limbs and organs replaced with mechanical ones. These mechanical limbs help protect people from the harsh radiation that still exists in much of Nigeria, which renders much of the land unlivable. Among her "sisters" is Ify, who was orphaned as a young child and was rescued by Onyii and brought to the camp. Onyii wants to protect Ify from ever having to experience war again. Ify wants to go to space one day and has developed an advanced machine called an Accent that allows her to hack other machines. Ify uses her Accent to get lessons about space from the Nigerians, but her signal is tracked by the Nigerians and her camp is attacked. The camp is torn apart and Ify is taken by the Nigerians.

Four years later, both of the sisters believe the other one is dead. Ify is the best student at her school in the Nigerian capital Abuja. She has dreams of attending college in America and going to space one day. Meanwhile, Onyii wants to get revenge for Ify's death and is the best soldier on both sides of the war, known as the Demon of Biafra. She won't stop until Biafra is recognized as a nation but there are days that she feels that the fighting will be endless. But Ify accidentally views top secret information and sees that Onyii is still alive. She is shown by the boy who adopted her, named Daren, a memory that they found in her, showing that Onyii was the one who killed her family when she was younger. Ify's new purpose in life is to kill Onyii and avenge her family's death. The two sides have reached a ceasefire and Onyii is living in the Biafran capital Enugu. Ify has found a refugee caravan to travel with and makes it to Enugu, where she is able to find Onyii's apartment. But before she can shoot Onyii, Enugu is blown up again. The Nigerians knew that Ify was going to find Onyii, and they put a tracker in her to find where the Demon of Biafra was. The ceasefire is broken and the two sides are again back at war. Onyii and Ify must now decide what they are willing to do for freedom.

Did the plot keep you interested?
