This book takes place in 2194 and humans have already colonized many other planets outside of Earth. The only way to get to these colonies is by using a spaceship's A-drive and A-jumping through space which is a form of really fast transportation through the universe.

Nax Hall and three other washouts of the Ellis Station Academy are just about to head back to Earth when the academy is attacked by a group of terrorists. The four of them, unseen by the intruders, steal the shuttle the terrorists arrived in and jump to another colony to escape death.

The four washouts end up crash landing on the colony of al-Rihla near the city of Saleem. There, they discover they were framed for the Ellis Station Academy attack and are wanted by law enforcement. They also uncover a plan by the organization Earth First to kill off human life on all colonies. With the help of Asra, who's stepfather is a member of Earth First, Nax and his new friends steal Asra's stepfather's very expensive, illegally modified spaceship and jump to the colony Serenity. They believe that Earth First shipped a special device to every colony in order to kill off the humans there. The colony, however, is unwilling to help and the only option left is to head towards Valen and hopefully get help from Nax's brother Malik. Malik works at the spaceport in Valen and only he can get them access to the spaceport and its packages. The group is able to steal the package sent by Earth First and while escaping more law enforcement, figure out exactly what their plan is and how destructive it can be. With time running out, will this hastily put together group be able to stop Earth First or will all life on colonies be wiped out?

Nax Hall is a hotshot pilot and got washed out because he tried something too fancy and crashed his simulation test. He has a history of making bad decisions and doesn't have good relationships with his parents. He becomes the captain of the small team and works hard to keep them safe. His fellow washouts are Zinaida (Zee/ Dr. Eyeliner), Casandra (Case/ Genius Girl), and Rion. Zee is a medical trainee and an amazing athlete. She always stays calm and has a really good kick. Case is an engineer and is very intelligent. She is the one who does all navigation and controls the power of the ship. Rion is a politician and can talk his way through things. He is useful for distracting guards or deceiving them. This group meets up with Asra who is very determined and is a master at hacking.

Now, I will answer some questions about the book:

*Did the plot keep you interested?* - This plot definitely kept me interested. There was a lot of action and suspense that made me not want to stop reading. Each event in this book leads up to the final outcome and the author just made me want to find out how it would end.

*Was the pace of the book too fast, too slow, or just right?* - I think the pace of this book was just right. The author kept the book moving with new events like when they stole Asra's stepfather's spaceship. The author also didn't push the pace too fast so I wouldn't understand the plot.

The Disasters takes place in the distant future, where humans have learned how to move through space faster than the speed of light. Earth has been sending explorers to other planets to form colonies there. Nax Hall is a 17-year old boy who applies for Ellis Station Academy, a school that trains pilots, medics, navigators, and so on. Nax is kicked out of the Academy because he crashed the ship in the simulation while trying to do a fancy manuever. He gets onto the ship that will take them home along with 3 other rejected students, Rion, a diplomat from London, Case, a girl genius and Zee, a talented medic. However, right before the ship takes off, a group of armed soldiers attack the ship. The rejects overpower the soldiers and barely escape the station by stealing one of the ships. While Nax pilots the shuttle away from the station, they realize that the soldiers overtook the station and let all the oxygen out, effectively killing every student in the Academy. The ship was damaged by the soldiers, and the group is forced to jump to the nearest colony and crash land, nearly dying in the process. The colony they land on is called al-Rihla, and the group starts to make their way to the nearest Earth Embassy, where they can report the incident. They receive help from a young boy, but suddenly meet a straAnger who tells them to come with her. The stranger introduces herself as Asra, and that the boy was leading them to the police station for reward money. Confused, the group asks what she meant, and she shows them that they were framed for the attack on the Academy. Asra leads them to a safe house and explains that her uncle is the local drug and weapons dealer, who is high up in the corrupted government of al-Rihla. Asra needs to escape the planet before he finds her, and she believes that they did not commit the crime. The ragtag group meets Asra's grandmother, who gives the group weapons and supplies. They pull off a daring heist and manage to steal Asra's uncles prize ship, a fast and armed expensive Honda Breakbolt Mark III. The group steals a tablet from one of the guards of the ship and reads the latest message, which is telling all members of Earth First to get loved ones off of the colonies. Asra explains that Earth First was a group of politicians, scientists, religious leaders and soldiers who believed that colonization of

other planets should be banned for various reasons. The group deduces that Earth First is trying to destroy all of the colonies to achieve their goal of banning colonies. They need a place to refuel and get modifications to the ship, so they ask for the help of Nax's brother Malik, who Nax hasn't spoken to in two years. Malik was in the same car as Nax when they got into an accident that nearly killed Malik, and Nax blamed himself and cut himself off from Malik. Malik gives them shelter and leads them to a mechanic who is willing to modify the ship so that they do not get detected by Earth First. The group intercepts messages and learns that they have a day to stop Earth First's plan to destroy the colonies using a machine. The group flies back to the Academy and fights their way to the machine, where they manage to destroy it and send all of Earth First's plans to the Earth government. The government gives them a pardon and an apology, as well as a lot of reward money. The academy gives all of the crew full scholarships, but the crew members all decline and decide to stay together to take jobs across the galaxy.

*Did the plot (for fiction) or presentation of information (for non-fiction) keep you interested?* The plot of *The Disasters* definitely kept me interested, as there was a lot of suspense and plot twists that kept you anticipating what would happen next.

Was the pace of the book too fast, too slow, or just right?

The pace of the book was a little fast, but you still had enough time to process everything. *What grade level(s) is this book appropriate for?*

**Summary**: The novel *The Disasters* by M. K. England is a novel about a group of highly skilled and intelligent 17-year-olds who discover the interstellar plot of a terrorist organization called Earth First to kill all the colonies that aren't on earth or its moon.

The beginning of the novel opens up with the main character, Nasir Alexander Hall getting rejected from the Ellis academy for pilot training getting made fun of a former classmate from high school who managed to get in, even though his previous endeavors such as getting high on laughing gas seem to be in direct opposition of the school's image. He is then required to board a train to travel back to earth after being rejected, the interesting thing is only 3 other people were on the train with him. The 3 people are called Zinaida Ivanova Rozhkova, Casandra Hwang-Torres, and Rion William Kwesi Turner. On the train down, they engage in some small talk but it is mostly strained due to their rejection from the academy. However, when the train just departed suddenly stops and a group of terrorists who we later learn to be called Earth First invade the station and kill everyone inside it by opening the airlock. Their main goal was to install something on the data servers which they accomplish. The train the 4 students are on quickly loses life support and they manage to take the lifeboat out to safety, after being discovered by the terrorist group.

The rejected students are all outstanding individuals and only get rejected from the academy due to bogus reasons such as trying out new tricks on the flight simulator test. Either way, after the students flee the space station, they light jump to a different colony and end up in Al-Rihla, one of the earliest settlements. On the planet, they meet Asra Haque, the daughter of the most corrupt politician in the colony. After saving the 4 people's lives they agree to work together to prevent the Earth First organization from succeeding. Afterward, they embark on a series of journies to restock supplies, find out information about the Earth First plan and

ultimately prevent it from happening. One such adventure takes Nasir to the colony his brother works at and they spend a few days recovering their prior relation which decayed due to Nasir almost killing his brother on a plane flight.

After finding out the plan to destroy all the colonists boiled down to sending out a signal from a transmitter to make all the machines suddenly send out a sonic blast which would kill everything, they rush to stop the transmitter from deploying. The 5 teenagers manage to pinpoint the transmitter which was in the Academy space station and end of destroying the transmitter. They do so by dimply blowing up the front doors with a giant missile and hacking into the transmitter to stop it from sending. While they were trying to escape, the Earth First group manages to trap them, but Nasir does some quick thinking and releases N2O on them, which makes them all incapacitated. During that time, the group sends the information about the Earth First group down to earth and are hailed as heroes for discovering the plan that could have killed all of the colonies Earth has spent making over the past few hundred years.

<u>Setting</u>: The novel takes place in an interstellar setting with some pit stops on a few made-up colonies that are located in planets far away.

<u>Time Period</u>: This novel takes place in the far future where light travel already exists.

# Main Events:

- The 4 teens are rejected from the academy
- They manage to escape a terrorist attack
- Crashland on a distant colony
- They are framed for the attack and are chased around the galaxy by the Earth First group under the disguise of the Tiger squadron
- Nasir's brother Malik helps them identify what plan the terrorists were going to use to destroy the colonies.
- Nasir and his group destroy the transmitter and send the plan's information back to earth headquarters where the arrest order on them is released.
- The 4 teenagers and Asra are hailed as heroes and given large rewards. They are also accepted into the academy but none of them end up going to it.

It is the year 2194 and space colonization has been going on for quite some time. Nax Hall is a bisexual 17-year-old who wants to be a pilot. After being kicked out of the Ellis Station Academy, where future colony officers train, because he crashed his flight simulation, Nax is forced to go back to Earth. Once he gets on the ship heading home, he meets the people who also failed. There is Zee, an athletic Kazakhstani girl who is good with medicine and was kicked out because she is trans; Case, a super-smart girl who is really good with tech but struggles from anxiety; and Rion, a wealthy black boy who is interested in politics and can stay calm and talk his way out of many difficult situations. When a group of terrorists attack the station and leaks the oxygen, killing everyone there, the four of them are the only surviving witnesses. The group escapes to the colony world of al-Rihla, but Nax crash-lands on a beach outside the city of Saleem. Nax feels responsible for the safety of the group and is mad at himself for not being a good enough pilot.

There, they meet a Pakistani girl named Asra, who is an expert hacker. She informs them that they are being framed for the attack on Ellis Station and turning themselves in would probably mean execution. Asra wants to get off the planet because she wants to get away from her dad, who is a prominent politician but also runs a secret drug-dealing ring. In a video message sent from Ellis Station, the headmaster tells everyone that all transportation to Earth-controlled space would be halted temporarily and would likely resume in 4 days. The group needs to figure out how to warn Earth about the potential dangers that might be coming. They

find out that this attack was planned by Earth First, a group against space colonization that appeared briefly when space colonization first became a thing. They know that Earth First probably has members as prominent figures on all the colonies. Case and Rion both start to develop feelings for Nax.

The group forms a plan to steal Asra's dad's spaceship and they escape to the planet Valen, where Nax's brother Malik is a security specialist for the spaceport authority. Nax hasn't talked to Malik in 2 years, after Nax crashed an aircar and severely injured Malik. Nax has PTSD from the incident and gets nervous every time he is flying a ship with other people in it. After landing in Valen, Nax talks things through with his brother and he realizes that Malik never hated him. All of them work together to find out that there is a super-strong signal that comes from Ellis Station that will cause all the speakers on a planet to blast at full volume, killing almost everyone. Asra finds out that the first test planet will be the illegal settlement of Tau'ri, where her mother and sister live. They must find out how to stop the attack from happening to save everyone on the colonies.

# Did the plot keep you interested?

Yes, the plot kept me interested. It was a very exciting situation that the characters were in and new information that was revealed during the book kept me wanting to read more. The story was full of action and was well thought out, and it was a nice adventure to read.

# Was the pace of the book too fast, too slow, or just right?

The pace of the book was pretty good. The story evolved quite quickly and I didn't get bored while reading any part of the book. The characters were constantly finding new things and flying to different places, but there were also some romantic parts of the book, with Case and Rion both having crushes on Nax.

The Disasters is set in the far future in the year 2194, when colonized worlds existed for years and space travel was a fact of life.
