Joseph is the new student at a school in Ireland, having just moved to Ireland from a country in Africa. He is mostly silent throughout the entire film, whereas he was more active and talkative before he moved. Joseph struggles to fit in with the other students. Two boys in his class named Seth Quinn and Christian Kelly give him trouble. Christian sits behind Joseph in the classroom, and gives him the nickname Live Aid. Whenever Chistian says something to Joseph to mock or tease him, the teacher stops her teaching and confronts him, which always leads to Chirstian denying his misdeeds. Every so often, before Christian says something rude to Joseph, he has flashbacks of his previous life in Africa, where his father was a teacher, and they all had a great time together and treated each other kindly. Unfortunately, one day, Joseph's father was taken and killed for teaching, and Joseph was forced to leave Africa. Christian, before the end of class, takes his finger with mucus on it and goads Joseph into grabbing onto his finger and throwing him to the ground, getting Joseph into trouble. A girl named Hazel O'Hara repeatedly tells the teacher that Christian has been giving Joseph trouble, yet the teacher pays barely any attention. Later, when the children go out for recess, milk is thrown at Joseph before he is surrounded by a Christian and several other boys. Seth and Christian attempt to fight Joseph before the teacher intercepts them. As the three boys stand in the hallway, Christian and Seth mock the teacher by repeating her words in a sarcastic way. They laugh as Hazel O'Hara attempts to persuade the teacher that Christian and Seth are guilty. Joseph, instead of staying quiet and obedient, decides to join in on the fun, calling out a word before the teacher says it, and laughs with the former bullies. Later, Joseph and the other boys head inside the classroom, but with different expressions on their faces.

How did you find this film on Kanopy (by title search, subject, casual browsing, etc.)? I was only casually browsing, and came across this film.

Did the plot (for fictional movie) or presentation of information (for documentary) keep you interested?

Yes, I like the interactions the characters had with each other, as well as the flashbacks of Joseph's old life in Africa.

Was the pace of the film too fast, too slow, or just right?

For a 10 minute film, the pacing worked out really well. Each short scene had enough for the viewer to know what's going on.

What grade level(s) is this film appropriate for?
