Antonio and Laz used to be very close and played baseball together, but Antonio began hanging out with the local drug dealer, Garrett. Ian Thurman is one of the best players in the state and is guaranteed to go to the major leagues. Laz has one of his best games and beats Ian's team. While there are no scouts or coaches in attendance, Ian's dad takes notice of Laz and compliments him. The team goes on to beat other select teams. Over the summer, Laz notices that more and more cars begin to show up at Garrett's house while Antonio is there, and Laz worries that Antonio could be in danger by associating with a drug dealer.
