The novel *Ace of Spades* written by debut author Faridah Àbíké-Íyímídé follows the two main protagonists Devon Richards and Chiamaka Adebayo. They are both high school seniors, and the only African American students that attend the infamous Niveus Private Academy, which is known for its wealth. This story takes place at the start of the new school year. Although Devon is extremely passionate for music and hopes to get into Juilliard, he feels like an outcast at his school not only because of his skin color, but, unlike all his other fellow wealthy students, he comes from the very poor side of town; his mother has to work multiple jobs to pay off his expensive tuition while struggling to pay the house bills, put food on the table, and provide for his younger brothers. The only other student at Niveus who he considers his “friend” is Jack, who also comes from his poor neighborhood, but the other students ignore him as if he were a ghost. That is why Devon is surprised to find out he was one of the Senior Perfects, which is given to the most well known and intelligent students at school. Chiamaka, on the other hand, is known as the “popular girl” in school, who takes as many challenging classes as possible while maintaining a high GPA and being the head of many after school clubs in hopes of getting into Yale. However, Chiamaka does not have real friends, except for Jamie; she only talks to other popular girls for social status. Due to her popularity and grades, no one is surprised to find out that she was chosen to be Senior Head Perfect. Although Devon and Chiamaka are the only African American students at their school, they never associate with each other ... until Aces comes along. At the start of the first week of the new school year, an anonymous person known as Aces exposes Devon and Chimaka’s darkest secrets and private relationships by texting private photos and videos to the entire students body at Niveus to try to take down Devon and Chiamaka's reputation. As Aces shows no signs of backing down, Devon and Chimaka work together to try to uncover who is behind these anonymous texts as they unravel surprising secrets along the way.

Did the plot (for fiction) or presentation of information (for nonfiction) keep you interested?
Absolutely, without a doubt! I felt that in almost every chapter throughout the book, there were many secrets revealed regarding the character’s personal life or the truth behind Aces which kept me interested and I wanted to continue reading.

Was the pace of the book too fast, too slow, or just right?

I felt that the overall pace of the book was just right. As I previously mentioned, many things were taking place in every chapter of the book and I felt that the pace of this book was slightly faster compared to the pace of other books I have read, but it kept the book interesting.

What grade level(s) is this book appropriate for?

I believe that this book is appropriate for older high schoolers (grades 11-12) or any older people. Like many Young Adult books, this book contains mature language and discusses mature topics; therefore, I feel that older readers may have a better understanding of this book. Also, because the main protagonists of the story are both high school seniors, I feel that it is more relatable for older audiences.

What type of reader would you recommend this book to?

I would recommend this book to any reader, but especially those who enjoy thriller books, mystery books, or books that discuss racism. The two main protagonists of this book are African American who receive prejudice and are treated unfairly by other white students, and even teachers. Also, this book involves LGBTQ+ romantic relationships and the discovery of one's sexuality. This book contains many topics that will keep any reader interested in the story.

What other information do you think would be helpful for teens to know about this book?

Some readers may be sensitive to certain topics discussed in this book, so I would recommend searching trigger warnings before reading. I would also recommend going to the author's website where one can find the trigger warnings of the book, artwork of some of the characters and some information about them, and even a spotify music playlist that correlates with the book (which I think is pretty cool!) Also, there is mature language throughout the book, so I would advise readers to be aware of that as well.

I would rate this book *4 stars: I enjoyed this book and found it worthwhile reading.* I had heard of this book before I read it, and I knew it was popular on social media, especially TikTok (or "booktok"). After reading the book, I now see why it is popular!
