Ricky Baker is a juvenile delinquent who after being abandoned by his mom, is taken into child welfare services. He is sent to live in the mountains with Bella Faulkner and her husband Hec. When Bella suddenly dies, news comes that child welfare is coming to take him back so he fakes his suicide and runs off into the mountains. He gets lost quickly and runs out of food. Hec is able to find him but the two of them get stranded in the mountains when Hec gets into a fight with Ricky and fractures his ankle. When child welfare comes to the empty farm, they come to the conclusion that Ricky was kidnapped by Hec and a national manhunt is started. Hec had a criminal history of manslaughter and Ricky's only path now was juvie so the two of them decided to go on the run. There, they survive, hoping that they don't get caught.

Ricky Baker is a bad kid who has a history of vandalism, stealing, and destroying. He is really fat and not very athletic. Ricky has no respect for adults and does whatever he wants to do. Bella Faulkner is kind and loving. She married Hec, a past criminal, and took in Ricky, a juvenile delinquent because she felt bad for them. Hec is remote and mentally unstable. He is illiterate but is an expert in surviving in the wild.

Eventually, the police and search chase find and corner them. Hetcor is sent to jail and Kahu and her father take care of Ricky. When Hector is released from jail, he joins Ricky and his new foster family.
