Amari and the Night Brothers is a story about perseverance and friendship. It takes place in modern times, around Atlanta, GA. The main character is an African American Girl named Amari Peters, who is 13 years old. Amari is brave, hardworking, kind, and dedicated. The story starts with us seeing Amari getting bullied by other people in school. Amari is from a poor free housing project part of town and got a scholarship to the private school she goes to. She is widely unaccepted and bullied and gets expelled for fighting back. We also find out Amari's older brother Quinton went missing after taking on a mysterious job. We learn that Quinton is extremely smart and kind. Amari soon gets an invitation from Quinton to go to the summer camp he went to.

Amari starts to learn that the summer camp is really a cover for the Bureau of Supernatural Investigations, which protects both the supernatural and regular world from harm. This is the same job her brother had, and what she believes caused him to go missing.

Proving to us that she has determination and bravery, Amari agrees to join the bureau in hopes of finding her brother. Upon arriving at the bureau, she is stunned to see all the supernatural things living amongst them. She also learns her brother was quite famous in the supernatural world and an accomplished agent.

Things get more intense when Amari's supernaturally enhanced power turns out to be magic. Magic and magicians are illegal in the supernatural world as they are incredibly dangerous, and some previous magicians caused a lot of problems for the bureau.

Amari is allowed to stay and prove herself. She wants to become an agent and follow in her brother's footsteps. Along the way she makes friends and also many enemies, who want her to be removed from the bureau because she has an illegal power. This is a similar situation to the one she faced back in the real world, where she is discriminated against because of her background and appearance and just overall because of who she is.

As the story progresses, we learn about the history of the bureau and learn about the potential problems, including the rise of the evil magicians known as the Night Brothers who troubled the bureau before.

Amari defies the odds and goes through the challenges. She shows perseverance through the challenges and setbacks, and even through betrayal and mystery, manages to defeat the bad guys and save her brother and his partner.

Did the plot or presentation of information keep you interested?

The plot was overall pretty good, but the beginning was a little slow. I found myself losing interest at times in the beginning, but things picked up much more towards the middle and end. I think the information is presented in a way that keeps you interested because you only get a little more information at a time that builds up to a climax.

Amari makes surprising discoveries and discovers the power to overcome with the aid of individuals she meets along the road. Amari shines even when she doesn't believe in herself because the author combines wonderful whimsy

with honest, honestly depicted circumstances. With excellent descriptions, a thrilling buildup, and strong themes against profiling, this topical, lively first-person tale moves rapidly.
