After his mother passed away when he was 6 years old, he decided to start his own detective agency, working to solve San Miguel's cases, along with his best friend Lily Krupitsky-Sharma. Except... no one was going to hire elementary school kids to solve a robbery. So, when Gideon was 10, he hired himself, to figure out what happened to his neighbor's missing jewelry. Miraculously, his unique mindset led him to do what even the police department and Chief Hank O' Hara couldn't even do. In the police's "gratitude", they had a televised "ceremony" for him. However, by the time that Middle School started, he decided to stop. After all, his fun little children's game was now being perceived as a ridiculous hobby, and everyone, including Lily, moved on. Nonetheless, Gideon continued to keep wearing his fedora, and watching his film noirs. Fast forward to the present, and Gideon Green is continuing life as he has been since he started high school - he wakes up, wears his trench coat, goes to school, sits at the same lunch table, and when he arrives home, watches his beloved film noirs while his had cooks at dinner service in his restaurant - Verde. That is, of course, until the day that Lily, who stopped their friendship years ago, suddenly appears at his front door. Lily had joined the Herald (the school paper)'s writing committee, and she wanted to write an article on one of San Miguel High School's students (Luke Dobson), getting arrested for vandalism. Naturally, Gideon should have been upset. After all, Lily had betrayed him, and now she wanted his help? However, the detective side of him, as well as his curiosity, led him to beckon for her to enter the house. He decides to help her, and joins the Herald as a cover this also pleases his dad, who was getting upset over his routines. Gideon grows to like the Herald's community, and actually finds pleasure in his time there. However while life takes a turn for the better following him joining, the case starts to take a much more serious and larger significance than once assumed. Now, will Gideon be able to take the benefits of his actions, or will his big result in even bigger consequences?

Did the plot (for fiction) or presentation of information (for nonfiction) keep you interested?

The plot of the book kept me mildly interested throughout the story. During the story's course of events, the revelations and actions seemed to bounce around a lot, affecting the story in both good and bad ways - A positive outcome was that is kept me going, wanting to find out what happened next, but it never really lived up to the excitement, and seemed to drown away my interest at many occasions. Overall, the book needed to work on its timing of events and presentation, but still can keep the reader going.

Was the pace of the book too fast, too slow, or just right?

Throughout much of the book, things seemed to be happening on two different levels, corresponding to the two major conflicts throughout the story. For Gideon's personal life, including his own struggles in school and at home, the book moved a bit slowly, and frankly, became slower as the book went on (something I personally dislike). As for the case he needed solving with Lily, the book went to fast, rushed key moments. Considering all of this, I think Henry needed to balance the book a bit more.

What grade level(s) is this book appropriate for?

I believe that this book is appropriate for any student from grade 7 onwards. The book discusses topics that may be difficult to understand for younger students, such as the events that occurred at the high school. In addition, older students may connect more to the book, giving them a better understanding of what happens.

What type of reader would you recommend this book to?

I would recommend this book to anyone that likes a combination of realistic fiction and mystery books, as Gideon Green in Black and White is a combination of both. As I discussed previously, the book runs on two different levels, and each corresponds (in a way) to the respective genres.

What other information do you think would be helpful for teens to know about this book?

While most of the information is explained clearly in the book, it is important for teens to know that this book takes place in San Miguel (part of San Diego County) in California, and is not as close to the beach as you may think - the latter detail becoming important later in the story. In addition, Gideon's mother died when he was 6, and his father is a chef.
