In the book *I Must Betray You* by Ruta Sepetys, Seventeen-year-old Cristian Florescu is living in Romania in the year 1989, during a time when Communism reigned. He and other Romanians had to stand in line for hours each day just to get the barely enough food to live off of, they lived in tiny apartments where heating and electricity shut off at frequent but unpredictable intervals, and any connection to the West was strictly prohibited. Worst of all, it was illegal to complain or go against anything to do with Romania or its government—and if anyone did, they would risk being caught by an informer, and the consequences would not be good.

Cristian, like most, is unhappy with the Romanian government, and finds small ways to rebel. He keeps a notebook full of all his woes, stored safely in his closet away from the cameras. He listens to an illegal radio, and hears news that other Communist countries are having revolutions, being freed at long last—but never anything about Romania. His mother cleans the house of an American family living in Romania, and Cristian even gets the chance to befriend their son, Dan, which gives him an insight into what life is like outside the oppressive country he has always lived in. Dan's family has plenty of food, and lives in comfort and ease.

Although it may seem that things can't get any worse for Cristian, they do. One day, the government discovers an American dollar he had, and the only way for him to stay out of trouble is to betray a good friend. The stakes are high—if Cristian complies, his grandfather will receive medicine for the leukemia that is slowly killing him, but at the cost of betraying another and constant secrecy. If he doesn't, it will land him in serious trouble. And all the while, the seeds of revolution are being planted. It will only take some time and care for them to take root and flourish into something much more meaningful—freedom.

Did the plot keep you interested?

Yes, the plot was very interesting. I couldn't put the book down!
