


"Think Like the Banned"





How to Participate: Fill out the Writing-Based Community Service Registration Form: https://forms.gle/EtXZ7cNK86V3tbYF9

Then read one of the Frequently Challenged and Banned Children's Picture Books titles (listed on the first page), then respond thoughtfully (in several sentences, please) to the Critical Thinking Questions listed below:

- 1. What is the title, author, publication date, and plot (in 1-2 sentences) of this picture book?
- 2. Were you aware of the existence of this book prior to starting this project?
- 3. This book was challenged and/or banned in America frequently enough for it to be included in The Top 100 Challenged Books Lists (between 1990-2021) compiled by the American Library Association. Why do you think this book was targeted?
- 4. Think like a Book Prosecution Lawyer: If you were arguing **in favor** of banning this book, what would your argument be?
- 5. Think like a Book Defense Lawyer: If you were arguing **against** banning this book, what would your argument be?
- 6. The contents of this book may be inflammatory to some people. Do you think the information/plot of the book is presented in an unbiased way, or do you feel like it is pushing an agenda (if so, is it a positive or negative agenda)?
- 7. This book presents information that may be useful and uplifting for some people. Can you cite any positive information or messages in the book?
- 8. Children's picture books are typically written for 2 to 8 year olds. One of the most frequent reasons children's picture books are challenged or banned in the United States is that they are considered to be "Unsuited for Age Group." What age group do you think this book is appropriate for?
- 9. Think about the picture books you read as a child: Would this book fit into the themes of what you read back then, or would it stand out as an anomaly?
- 10. Pretend you are a Parent: If you were in a library, would you pick out this book and read it to you your child; why or why not? Explain your answer.

BONUS QUESTION: Can you think of another book that you have read (picture book or novel) that contains the same themes as this book?

Email the completed questions as a Word Doc or Google Doc to the Teen Services Librarian, Emily Ostrander, at teens@emmaclark.org. Include your full name and grade. Accepted responses will earn 1 hour of community service credit.

You may submit up to 12 responses per calendar year; please do not repeat titles. Accepted responses may be published on the Emma Clark Library Website and Social Media!
