All of Us Villains by Amanda Foody and Christine Lynn Herman is an engrossing novel that takes place in a cursed village called Ilvernath. In Ilvernath, there are seven great families that must select one champion to take part in a deadly tournament every generation with the coming of the Blood Moon. It lasts three months, or until only one champion remains, and the other six are killed. The winner's family then gets the prize of being able to control high magick until the next tournament rolls around, when it all happens again. The novel follows the stories of four champions pitted against each other: Alistair Lowe, Briony Thorburn, Gavin Grieve, and Isobel Macaslan. The Lowes have always been the most powerful and feared of all the families, and won two-thirds of the tournaments ever held, including the one prior to this one. Growing up, Alistair had always known he'd be champion, and his family has conditioned him to be the monster he must be in order to win this tournament. However, something devastating happens just before the tournament begins that makes him question whether or not it is worth it after all. Like Alistair, Briony has always known she'd be a champion, but soon, she finds out she is mistaken when her sister is chosen instead. Nonetheless, Briony is determined to find her way in, not only for the honor to compete, but to possibly save everyone. The Macaslans have always been scorned for their unethical ways of collecting raw magick, and when Isobel was the first champion to be announced an entire year before the start of the tournament, she drew an enormous amount of unwanted attention from the press. She is determined to be the champion who comes out victorious, despite her mother not wanting her to compete at all. Finally, the Grieves were always something of a joke to the rest of Ilvernath, but Gavin is smart, hardworking, and eager to prove his worth. When the tournament begins, they will all be forced to fight to the death—unless, of course, they can find another way, a way to end it all.
