Upon entering his last year of high school, Percy Jackson is thrilled at the thought of finally being able to relax; no more fighting monsters, and no more completing quests at the will of the gods. All he has to do is get into New Rome University with his girlfriend, Annabeth Chase. Of course, this is not as easy as it sounds -On his first day of school, Percy receives a summons to the guidance office. There, he finds Eudora, the school "counselor." She tells him that, in order to get into New Rome University, he will need to obtain recommendation letters from three gods. These gods must come to him, most likely with a task that needs to be completed. A few days later, Ganymede, cupbearer of the gods, arrives with the first request. Ganymede is responsible for providing drinks to the gods at their will. At special events, he must use the "Chalice of the Gods," to pour the drinks. (This chalice, amongst other powers, can grant immortality to anyone that drinks from it.) However, Ganymede has lost this chalice, and needs it before the next feast (which could occur at any time), shan't he face Zeus' wrath. Thus, the iconic trio of Percy ("preloaded" with sarcasm), Annabeth (nicknamed "Wise Girl"), and Grover (a half-goat full of hunger and anxiety) return for yet another quest. The three are almost certain that the chalice had been stolen. Specifically, they suspect either Hebe (the goddess of youth) or Iris (the goddess of the rainbow), as both of them formerly held Ganymede's position. They first visit Hebe, at her store in Manhattan. Unfortunately for them, their visit does not go as planned, and, in interrogating her, actually offend the goddess. This results in Hebe turning them into eight year olds. After a long battle, involving some wild chickens, they are finally able to convince her to return them back to their normal selves. After leaving, with the knowledge that Hebe definitely did not steal the chalice, they decide to visit Iris (with more caution, this time). While they find out that Iris also did not have the chalice, she did have information about who did steal it. As per usual, the information did not come for free - So, Percy and Annabeth go to Camp Half-Blood (on Long Island) to complete another, albeit "minor", task. Finally, after a long struggle, they know who has the chalice: now, it is just a matter of getting it back...

Did the plot keep you interested?

Yes, the plot kept me very interested throughout the entire book. The way that the author decided to present the events made it that I always wanted to find out the latest development in the situation.

Was the pace of the book too fast, too slow, or just right?

I found the pace of the book to be perfect - I did not feel that the author was rushing to recount any battle/situation, but also did not spend too long describing them.

What grade level(s) is this book appropriate for?

I feel that this book would be appropriate for students in sixth grade or higher. It is not very complex to read, but also requires deep comprehension skills that younger audiences may not possess.
